Study

No ethnic minority grouping is homogeneous; there are the rich and the poor, the educated and the uneducated, the religious and the non-devout, so why exclude Africans? One would have thought that the whole point about a minority member conducting this minority survey was in order to make it all-inclusive. So this time around it is a black brother who is excluding us.

Educated

Africans are probably the most educated minority group and our children are doing well. We do not go cap in hand begging from borough to borough for cash to take care of their elderly or young; we have our traditional languages but do not demand translation services; we practise our culture with some pomp; we sort out our social problems without recourse to state funding and support. So I say to Africans: we now need to start asserting the positives of being African, to remind the whole world of the origin of human species, culture as we know it, the start of religion, civilisation, politics and science.

Let us all start telling other ethnic minorities that we Africans are proud of our continent.
